1. 다음을 듣고, 여자가 하는 말의 목적으로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.

W: Good afternoon, students. This is your vice principal, Ms. Emily Johnson. I'd like to let you know about an important update to our school entrances. Starting next Monday, the current main entrance will be permanently closed as part of a safety improvement project. Instead, a new entrance on the south side of the school will be opened as the main entrance. All students should enter and exit the school through this new entrance. Signs will be posted to guide you, and staff members will be there to assist during busy times. Please remember to use the new entrance for your safety and convenience. Thank you for your cooperation.

2. 대화를 듣고, 남자의 의견으로 가장 적절한 것을 고르시오.

M: Hey, Alice, did you listen to the song I sent you?

Daniel, who tests the app, finds a serious problem in user settings. Jane wants to release the app as scheduled, believing the problem can be fixed later through an update. However, Daniel thinks that if users experience an error right after downloading the app, they may leave negative reviews and stop using it. He believes this could harm the app's success in the long run. He thinks fixing the problem is more important than meeting the original deadline. So, Daniel wants to suggest to Jane that they delay the launch to fix the issue. In this situation, what would Daniel most likely say to Jane?

M: Hello, everyone. Welcome to *Today's Insight*. Many foods commonly eaten today were not consumed in the past because they were regarded as inedible. Here are four foods that were believed to be not appropriate for human consumption. First, tomatoes belonged to the same plant family as some poisonous plants. In addition, tomatoes were believed to cause illness when they were served on metal plates. Second, carrots were not consumed in everyday meals in the past because of their strange colors like purple or white. Instead, they were mainly used for animal feed. People became familiar with the orange carrots of today only after selective farming. Next, corn also caused worries in some European regions. People became sick when they ate corn prepared without traditional Native-American cooking methods. That made people believe that corn itself was unhealthy. Finally, eggplants were once thought to be highly poisonous. Their flowers and leaves could be harmful if eaten in large amounts. Today, these foods are cooked properly and eaten safely. Tomorrow, we'll see where delicious desserts come from.
